

### From Truck Repair to a Retirement of Saving Classic Deere's

Con Holleman went to tech school for the automotive trade right out of high school. There was no diesel training yet at that time. He went for a year and half and was hired by a Dodge dealer in Ferndale before he finished tech school. The owner came to the school looking for an employee and the teacher pointed to Con and said there is your guy.

Couple years later in 1968 a similar incident happened. The owner of a large truck repair shop called and that's where he learned all about trucks. Con enjoyed that job and he also got a lot of experience fabricating trailers to haul grain, alfalfa, alfalfa cubes and potatoes.

In 1980 the customer that Con did the trailer work for asked if he could work for him. He had built a new shop for his own trucks and trailers and he needed Con. There he got more experience servicing trucks, trailers and fabricating trailers.

In 1987 Con rented a building and started his own large truck repair shop called Lynden Truck Repair. A year later he bought some land with a building and grew the business from himself and one employee to four employees. Con ran the shop for 18 years. He had a surprise in 2005 when Brim Tractor bought everything he had including the land and business.

Brim was looking for land because he had just sold his property to Rite Aid. Con was 60 and decided to retire. Now what to do? Con had a farm that has been going since 1973 so he had plenty to do. Then Jim Hale from Washington Tractor called and wanted him to help on the parts counter. Con told him he didn't need a job because he made hay in the summer. Jim insisted so Con agreed for only one year. He agreed. So that job lasted through 2006.

During that stint at the Deere dealership Con met a lot of farmers that had old needy tractors. So in 2007 he remodeled one of his barns and made it into a shop. This started the tractor restoration gig. Con didn't enjoy painting and body work so he found a friend that could help with that. He did tractors from year's 1917 into the 1980's. During that time Con joined the Cascade 2 cylinder tractor club. What a wonderful group of men! Now during the last ten years or more it has been all just mechanical repairs on all kinds of tractors plus lawn mowers, 4x4's, weed eaters, and almost anything except a truck. Con notes that he doesn't have any old tractors but he does have two newer 2nd generation Deere's that he uses on the farm. Con states that his dad did farm with John Deere tractors. Like a lot of us, Con enjoys the sound of the old 2 cylinder John Deere.

When he started the tractor repair gig Con asked the Lord to help him in the shop because even though it was all mechanical, trucks and tractors are much different. He knew nothing about what he was about to do. One gentleman that helped him tremendously was John Maas. *Continued on page 3*







With the tractor running and out of gear and clutch engaged, a very loud knock was heard behind the housing cover behind the clutch pulley. He took the pulley and cover off to expose the 1st and 2nd reduction drive gears. When he took the pulley off he noticed the clutch gear had a new wear pattern on the teeth. Everything looked good behind the cover. Gears seemed to be in place and could not go any closer to the main trans housing. Gears didn't seem to be beveled. 1st reduction gear was hitting the side of the case for some reason. Con left it and fixed other things on the tractor. He did notice that when he took the cover off that someone had been in there before him. The owner had just bought the tractor. On the morning of July the fourth, at 10 minutes after 5AM he heard a

voice as plain as day telling him to "flip the gear". It was amazing. He got up later and went to the shop and measured the distance from the outside of the gear to the trans housing. Yes, he was able to slip the gear right off. He flipped the gear and slid it back on. Con measured again and lost protrusion of 3/16 of an inch. Exactly what he needed. Again the Lord told Con what to do. This has happened many times. Con claims to be no know it all person but just uses common sense and does what the Lord tells him what to do.

Con says it's been a great life during his whole career. Con has been able to help a lot of very nice people which he enjoys. He has been able to many times repair tractors with the customer over the phone which is really good.

## 100th Anniversary of the Model D John Deere

### **Noteworthy Facts**

The "D" had a 30 year production run which started in 1923 and ended in 1953. This was the longest run of any Deere to date. 158,308 "Ds" were produced. 111,386 unstyled and 46,922 styled.

50 spoker Ds were built in 1923 and were advertised to have a conservative 27 belt and 15 drawbar horse power. 764 were built in 1924 and 3,896 in 1925. The demand kept increasing. In the early model a weakness was found in the welded front axle which was quickly changed. The spoker flywheel developed cracks so it was reduced in size. Still cracks were occurring so the flywheel was changed to a solid form. These also cracked. The 7/8" flywheel hole was considered to be the problem so the hole was enlarged to 2 inches. The 7/8" hole was called the nickel hole flywheel and Deere offered to replace. Most were but some were not making them a very collectable D. In 1925 Deere added a optional p.t.o. to make them competitive with the I.H.C. tractor. In 1927 the USDA purchased 440 Ds with p.t.o. that were called "stubble beaters". The tractors were rented to the farmers to work Continued to page 4

the fields in fall to destroy the corn borers winter refuge. This program lasted several years and was successful. The tractors were regular Ds except for the stencil indication that they were part of the corn borer control program with a number. These tractors are considered slightly more valuable as a collector tractor.

In 1928 the "D" was given more displacement and a different carb. They were now rated at 28 drawbar and 36 belt horse power. The wheels had more adjustment holes and an extensions for traction to pull 3 bottom plow. Deere was constantly improving the tractor to stay competitive with the IHC tractor. In 1929 Deere sold 23,722 "Ds". This was the largest production in the 30 year history. Note that this was the start of the Depression that hadn't hit the farmers yet. In 1932 155 "D" were built. In 1933 607 were built and rubber tires were offered as an option. We don't know how many were in sold those years. Depression "Ds" are considered collectable. In 1931 the "D" was given more power with 40 belt hp. The steering was also improved and a few other small items. Deere also had developed a third gear but there was a concern that the Depression hurting farmers may not be able to afford if any new tractor. aci


